We are here for you.'  - Providing up to 3 additional antenatal scans for pregnant women and their partners who have previously suffered from baby loss – the 'Story Raine Project'.  - Providing support for wider family members such as grandparents within our closed online support group

		We are proud to have provided immediate support to 13 families to help them navigate the devastating aftermath of baby loss:  • 10 families opted for relaxing getaways  - 3 of these opted for hotel stays at the Scarlet hotel, Cornwall  - 6 of these opted for stays at Deerpark log cabins, Cornwall  - 1 of these opted for Finlake lodges, Devon  • 1 family opted for food shopping deliveries for a total of 1 week  • 2 families opted for 1–2–1 support and no services
		Total = 13 families  Furthermore, we have also helped 9 families navigate pregnancy after baby loss through the 'Story Raine Project':  18 scans undertaken a further 2 scans were granted through an online giveaway to celebrate 1 year of this new service and to raise awareness in order to reach more families in need
		Total = 20 scans  We believe that the immediate aftercare and tangible support we delivered, allowed families to grieve in peace at such a devastating time and that the unique antenatal services provided comfort and reassurance, which supported physical and mental wellbeing at an extremely stressful, anxious and emotional time.

Every minute of volunteering made a profound difference by contributing towards the charity's aims and objectives, helping to deliver and further enhance the volume, range and quality of our services, by giving freely of their time, skills, knowledge, expertise and/or experience.  Although we are a small charity, we aim to ensure there are no barriers to involvement,

	so, in some specific circumstances, it may be possible for our Trustees to approve a contribution towards certain expenses incurred in the course of volunteering, such as travelling (at the mileage rate of 45p per mile) or reasonable subsistence.  Each case is judged on its merits, needs to be approved in advance and must be supported by receipts and a signed declaration (so that we can provide transparency that the charity's funds have been properly appropriated).

Para 1.20	The charity has directly supported families that have suffered the impact of stillbirth or neonatal death, benefiting the mental and physical health of its beneficiaries at a critical point in their lives.  The charity has maintained an online support network for baby loss families to connect with one another and share their experiences, advice and coping mechanisms, benefiting the mental and physical health of grieving parents and their wider family members.  The charity has increased public awareness around the sensitive topic of stillbirth and neonatal death, to reduce the taboo nature associated with baby loss, benefiting wider members of the community that interact with those experiencing baby loss.  The charity has increased its reserves to help achieve our long term aim, to raise sufficient funds to procure a lodge, 'Luna's Lodge', so that the charity can more directly support grieving parents and wider family members through respite and through 'baby moon' breaks during pregnancy after loss.

## **Financial Review**

Review of the charity's financial position at the end of the period	Para 1.21	Despite the post–COVID economic challenges, the Trustees are pleased to report that having supported beneficiaries and further expanded our services, the Charity's reserves increased during this period by £23,751 from £89,904 to £113,655 which are held in the charity bank account.  Income was secured from the generosity of donations and from the pro–activity of fundraising and awareness events that could be safely undertaken within the prevailing COVID precautions. In addition, we secured our first grant funding.  The main expenditure was delivering our services to beneficiaries.  The charity employed its first member of staff towards the end of the period and the first staff costs feature in this year's accounts.  We invested in materials, equipment and communications channels that help us to raise awareness of baby loss via promotional materials and events, and by maintaining a visible online presence so that we could advertise our services, signpost new beneficiaries and provide online support networks to new and
		existing families.
Statement explaining the policy for holding reserves stating why they are held	Para 1.22	The charity continues to hold reserves to deliver our services, the volumes of which are unpredictable, and to enable us to further expand our offer and to extend our reach to include other hospital catchment areas in Cornwall and Devon.

		In the longer-term, we aim to acquire a lodge to provide a safe space of respite for grieving parents as well as short respite breaks for parents during pregnancy after baby loss to enable them to de-stress.  We are proud to have helped our first family from the Exeter hospital catchment area, which is outside of our stated area. The Trustees determined that with our capacity and resources at the time, we would be able to support this request.
